THE HARKNESS DISCUSSION It is called the Harkness discussion method because it was developed at Phillips Exeter Academy with funds donated in the thirties by Edward L. Harkness. It involves students seated in a circle, motivating and controlling their own discussion. although he/she might begin or shift or even direct a discussion.

The Whole Group Discussion Technique follows the Harkness Method. It involves interaction throughout the class instead of the teacher simply delivering a lecture with students listening. Many teachers today prefer this approach because of heightened communication between the mentor and students.

Grading a Harkness Discussion: Helpful Resources - Teach ...

During the Harkness discussion, the teacher may choose to simply sit and make notes on the dynamics of the discussion. The teacher may pause the discussion at various intervals for a “reality check” by

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asking the class to self-assess.

Classical Teaching: Harkness Discussion Guidelines

The Harkness method of teaching and learning is a discussion-based education method involving small groups of students (usually 8-12) seated around an oval table to share thoughts and ideas and to learn good reasoning and discussion skills. These discussions involve minimal interjection from instructors in order to encourage student engagement.

Introducing and Using the Discussion (AKA Harkness) Table

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The Harkness class will generally have, nonetheless, a Socratic feel, in that students' ideas are questioned and commented upon. For the most part though, these questions and comments will come from the students' peers rather than the teacher. Harkness is not just "teaching through discussion."

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
