In 2006, the Roy Lichtenstein Foundation published an image of the painting on its holiday greeting card and asked the art community if they would like to purchase it. The painting was found in a New York warehouse, after having been displayed in Bogota, Colombia.

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Whaam! is a 1963 diptych painting by the American artist Roy Lichtenstein. It is one of the best-known works of pop art, and among Lichtenstein's most important paintings. Whaam! was first exhibited at the Leo Castelli Gallery in New York City in 1963, and purchased by the Tate Gallery in London, in 1966. It has been on permanent display at Tate Modern since 2006.

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
