New Neonatal Resuscitation Guidelines Released

The NRP recommends that at every delivery, at least one person who is responsible for the care of the newborn, capable of initiating resuscitation, and skilled in the provision of PPV and chest compressions must be present. A second person skilled in more advanced resuscitation procedures should be readily available to assist.

In 2006, the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American Heart Association published the 2005 guidelines on neonatal resuscitation (1). The most significant effect of these guidelines on obstetric practice related to the management of delivery of a newborn with meconium-stained amniotic fluid.

neonatal resuscitation guidelines are epinephrine and normal saline (0.9% NaCl).6 Neither sodium bicarbonate nor Ringer's Lactate is recommended during neonatal resuscitation. Epinephrine should be given if the heart rate stays less than 60 bpm despite providing 30 seconds of effective positivepressure ventilation that moves the chest, and another 60 seconds of coordinated chest compressions and ventilations using 100% oxygen.

NRP 7th Edition Update - Dr. Anne Wlodaver new recommendation was made prematurely. He Page 11/18

pointed out that the 2015 recommendation came from the same data as the three previous versions of the guidelines for delivery room management of the meconium-stained baby (used for NRP 4th, 5th, and 6th editions), all of which recommended intubation and tracheal suction at birth in non-vigorous newborns.

Some of the changes in recommendations for neonatal resuscitation include: non-vigorous newborns with meconium-stained fluid do not require routine intubation and tracheal suctioning cord clamping should be delayed for at least 30 to 60 seconds for most vigorous term and preterm newborns

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(insufficient evidence to support delayed cord clamping for newborns who require resuscitation)

TIMING OF UMBILICAL CORD CLAMPING - The 2017 NRP guidelines recommend a 30- to 60-second delay in clamping in all term and preterm Page 17/18

infants not requiring resuscitation. - If the placental circulation is disrupted (e.g., placental abruption), the cord should be clamped immediately.

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
