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This truth is illuminated in Langston Hughes' short story, "Thank You Ma'am," when a woman helps a boy from the wrong side of the tracks get back on the right path, even though he has wronged her. The woman's merciful yet firm stance enlightens the mischievous boy about the error of his ways.
