More from Gregory of Nyssa's The Life of Moses: Gregory sees the death of the firstborn in Egypt as teaching "when through virtue one comes to grips with any evil, he must completely destroy the first beginnings of evil" (57).

The Life of Moses by Gregory of Nyssa

Gregory wrote the work as response to a request for guidance in the spiritual life. Moses is taken up as an example of the spiritual journey rather than as the subject per se. His life and work serve as illustrations of the deeper realities that constitute the spiritual life and which lay behind life as we perceive it.

About the Author St. Gregory of Nyssa (c 335 – after 394) was a Christian bishop and saint. He was a younger brother of Basil the Great and a good friend of Gregory of Nazianzus. His significance has long been recognized in the Eastern Orthodox, Oriental Orthodox, Eastern Catholic and Roman Catholic branches of Christianity.

Gregory's Life of Moses also illustrates his sophisticated philosophical theology, indebted to Platonism, albeit with a pronounced

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ambivalence toward pagan learning. Gregory acknowledges "the riches of reason," and affirms that "there are certain things derived from profane education which should not be rejected," even though pagan learning is "always in labor but never giving birth."

For Gregory, the life of Moses was a type, or example, of the life of virtue... which, for followers of Jesus is the goal of the Christian life. A few of Gregory's spiritual/theological conclusions: 1. When God shielded Moses in the rock, passed by, and showed him God's "back," it was an invitation to Moses to follow God in the life of faith and the pursuit of virtue.

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The childhood of Moses was in fact a mixture of both, as the young Hebrew was educated in pagan learning yet nurtured by his natural mother, a Hebrew. His life of godliness, however, began with theophany. Gregory characterizes this encounter with the burning bush in terms of the senses: sight and hearing.
